At some point in time, I introduced Bro Connor to my dad and then to the church he attended. It was a Convention church, but they began to send offerings as well as I can recall. Dad was teacher of a strong Bible class at the factory where he worked. They met at their lunch hour and they also sent offerings. I remember the time when Pastor Connor visited the factory and was given a VIP tour of the plant and then he was able to address the members of that class. It was a very thrilling time for me.

We were introduced as "Daddy Ditch and Sonny Ditch" and most of the people we met had not seen a second generation Baptist.

I have a file of letters in my office that came through the years from my dear friend, Pastor Connor. These were some of my dearest times and they still live in my old heart. Now both Dad and Pastor Connor are in heaven in the presence of the KING and no more problems with sin, self, or Satan, and I am Daddy Ditch.

After some 20 years, it was my joy to return to the island with my young friend, Pastor Tim Gibson. What a time that was for both of us! The island had changed so much I did not recognize very much. The radio station was gone and many buildings had been erected. The one thing that remained was the sweet, sweet spirit of the saints at Antioch Baptist Church. By now there was a new, shorter Pastor Connor and he has become very dear to my heart.

One more trip with two pastors, Pastor Eddy Flowers and Pastor Perry Irvin sums up my visits to the island. Things had changed again, but the spirit of God in the church had not changed and once again, it was a time of special memories for an old man

By God's grace, First Baptist Church has been able to partner with you all for several years now and many of the members of this church have also graduated and are waiting in glory for those of us who remain in these clay bodies. How I thank and praise God that you have stayed in the battle and have continued to reach precious souls for Christ. Message from **RAY DITCH**

First Baptist Church, Illinois, USA

My introduction to the beautiful island of St Kitts was in the fall of 1972 when my wife and I traveled from our home in Illinois to South Carolina to see our first grandchild. She, like all grandchildren, was beautiful and we found ourselves visiting at the very time when the Northside Baptist Church where Bro Ed McAbee was pastor. They were having their annual Missions Conference. I had been a pastor of a Southern Baptist church and had never even heard of such a meeting. It was in that meeting a very tall giant of a man was called to speak. His name was William Connor and his message was very stirring to say the least.

When he had ended his message, Pastor McAbee began to relate how the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention was withdrawing their support of \$200 per month from the Antioch Baptist Church where Pastor Connor served. They would be doing this a span of four years, on a scale of \$50 per year. This was decided on the report of a representative from the SBC who had visited the island and went home to say there were about 600 attending Sunday services and they did not need any financial assistance with such an attendance. He never bothered to consult Pastor Connor or any other member to ask concerning the finances of the church. Back then the offerings were very small in comparison to the attendance so the report went in based on the number of people rather than the amount of the offerings.

Bro Ed said he believed there would be at least 10 churches that would give even \$20 per month to make up the amount the SBC was withdrawing. When I heard this statement, I immediately stood to my feet and announced that our baby church would be one of the ten who would make up the support that was being withdrawn.

By this time the SBC had withdrawn fellowship from our baby church because we were "not cooperating" with the programs of the convention. Knowing our people I was certain they would respond with a positive vote, but even if that did not happen, I would do this on my own. As I made the announcement, it seemed Pastor Connor and I both began to move to one another and we met in the aisle and then I saw how tall he was and he saw how short and fat I was. We spoke briefly and I took the information we would need to send the first offering to a place unknown to me, somewhere in the West Indies, where that might be.

When I returned to Illinois the church received the challenge with great joy and we began a friendship with a sister church far away. It was some time after that when Pastor Connor came to the States for another series of meetings that we made arrangements for him to come to our church. After his first visit to First Baptist he was like one of our family.

I give Praise to God for His Goodness, and for His Mercy, which rewrote my life at Antioch Baptist Church some thirty two (32) years ago. I thank you for your labour of love.

You have come this far by faith and through your ministry God has blessed our nation immensely. Your founding members planted those seed of faith though which God is blessing us today in various congregations. This Church has a glorious past and God's expectations of you are even greater today. The Lord has blessed the Antioch Baptist Church with 50 glorious and fruitful years in history! Let us give all honor and glory to God as we celebrate this milestone. May this celebration encourage you to look closely at yourselves and reflect on your legacy. Look back at miraculous past of five decades of service and commitment to the Word of God. By reflecting on your past and rekindling the flame of your calling and salvation, you can be prepared to accept everything the Lord has in store for your church, for those who love Him, for those who are called according to His purposes.

I pay special tribute and honour to the giants of the faith who blazed a trail of witness to our nation and service to God. Thank God for the Giant of Purpose, of Service and Witness, the Late Rev Dr William Connor. We are constantly reminded that we stand on the shoulders of these Christian giants who blazed the trail before us. Without their faith, courage, and vision, we would not be here today. The church has been mightily blessed by successive Ministers whose commitment has ensured the smooth running of the church.

Your 50 years of experiences testify to God's faithfulness to His people and that is undoubtedly chronicled in your history. We celebrate with you and thank our Lord that your march was never hindered by the work of the enemy. The church continues to grow and become stronger each day. Truly, the mighty hand of God is at work and he is always at your side. You have weathered the storms , you have emerged victorious through trial and trouble, the problems and struggles that you have overcome have now become blessings and steppingstones, this is all because of God's Grace. Certainly, God has been your shield and strength. He has guided you with His counsel; blessed you by his providence and inspired you by His Spirit.

The Living Vision

Every nation has its heroes, its visionaries, its champions. Pastor William Connor must be categorised as one of the champions of the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis.

In an era of reverse colonisation when Caribbean people were 'colonising' the domain of the colonisers, Pastor Connor could have left his native land and taken on the nationality of some distant country as many did during the 1950's and 60's, the emerging post colonisation period in the Caribbean and the period immediately after World War II. Instead, he remained at home and established a Sunday school for what he described as "underprivileged, unwanted, despised, neglected and down trodden children of the village" where he was raised. This Sunday School would gain a solid footing and evolve giving birth to the Baptist Movement in the Federation and a beacon known as the Antioch Baptist Church, first established Baptist Church, in the Federation.

William Manasseh Connor was born on the first day of summer 1921, June 21st. William Connor was an imposing 6'6" and he would joke that his height was the result of him being born on the longest day of the year. In the words of Mrs. Patricia 'Dolly' Arthur, "he was tall, elegant and holiness oozed from him." His sister, Edith (1924-2010) in recounting some of their family history, recalled that he was the fourth child of his parents, Mary Burke and James Connor. He was raised in a single parent home, having lost his father at a tender age. As a result of this misfortune, William's family faced many challenges which were fuelled by poverty. Consequently, Edith disclosed, "William had to seek employment at age eleven when most boys his age would have been at school. He earned a meager two cents for each pound of cotton he harvested as a field labourer at Needsmust Estate.



Often in life, we are amazed at that type of people God would use to fulfill his purpose; however, Saint Paul reminds us that, "God uses the foolish things of the world to confound the wise." Though limited in education, William would complete various short term employment. However, at age 22, in 1943, he was given the opportunity to become sexton of the St. Georges Anglican church and accepted it.

The job included ringing the bell and cleaning and preparing the church for services among other things. This assignment gave him the opportunity for growth, outreach and mentorship. William applied himself to the task with precision, and served in the capacity faithfully for 19 years from 1943 until he resigned in 1962.

As sexton of the St. George's Anglican Church, William came into contact with many people who later helped him. Two notable ones were Mr. James Cardin who established the Infirmary, later called the Cardin Home in his honour, and Mr. Brookes a local Methodist minister, who both mentored, encouraged and introduced him to various forms of religious literature. He read about Reformers like John Wycliffe, John Huss, John Calvin and Martin Luther, but he was most impacted by the work of Robert Raikes who began the Sunday school movement in England.

The year was 1949, while South Africa was institutionalizing Apartheid—racial segregation against blacks, there at home William was feeling a sense of compassion for his people. When William observed hundreds of underprivileged children running around the streets, he, like Robert Raikes was moved with compassion and started a Sunday school with thirteen children in the St. Johnston Village area. His love for the children earned him the affectionate title, "Brother Connor."

With a mere thirteen children, Bro Connor began the St. Johnson Village Sunday School—so called because the Sunday School was not affiliated with any religious denomination. However, as Bro Connor was sexton of the Anglican Church, many of the teachers were teenagers from the church. Some of the earliest teachers and workers who assisted Bro Connor were Eunice Boon, who migrated to Canada in 1960; Mavis Osborne; Ida Kelly; Delano Maynard; Beatile Flemming; and Misses Cynthia Francis and M Matthew.

Teachers were required to teach pupils a golden text every Sunday and have them recite it. Pupils were given a verse or hymn to learn and were expected to memorise it. Within a few months, the school experienced phenomenal growth resulting in the introduction of six classes: Beginners, Primary, Juniors, Intermediate, Seniors and Adults.

My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I am deeply grateful to God for the opportunity to extend to you prayerful good wishes, as you commence the 50th Anniversary celebrations of the establishment of the Antioch Baptist Church. The significance of this occasion is enhanced by the fact that the Antioch Baptist Church is the first established Baptist Church in the Federation of St. Kitts-Nevis.

While recognizing the achievements of the past and thanking God for them, we are at the same time challenged by celebrations of this nature to discern the future into which we, as church, are being invited by the Lord. (cf. Rev. 2:29; 3:6; & 3:22). In this regard, it would appear that the amazing personal faith journey of your first pastor – Rev. Dr. William M. Connor – contains within itself the seeds and sense of that future direction. Even a cursory reading of Dr. Connor's biography would reveal the intriguing manner in which his journey of faith was marked by other Christian traditions – notably the Anglican and Methodist traditions. Such an ecumenical formation in the Faith no doubt influenced his own understanding of Church, mission and ministry. This is evidenced by his engagement with organizations such as The International Council of Christian Churches and The St. Kitts Evangelical Association.

In light of Dr. Connor's formative experience, as you forge ahead with the construction of your new sanctuary at Lime Kiln Commercial Development, I pray that this project may be to you a constant reminder that building a church has more to do with nurturing the growth of the community of believers, than with erecting physical structures. The apostle Paul reminds us of this when, in 1 Corinthians 3:9, he says quite emphatically: "You are...God's building." He continues this line of thought in Ephesians 2: 21 & 22 when he expresses the hope that "... all grow into one holy temple in the Lord..." (cf. 1 Peter 2: 4 & 5).

My dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ, in keeping with the mind of Paul, and with the ecumenical thrust of Rev. Connor, my prayer for you on this occasion is that "... planted in love and built on love, you will with all the saints [i.e. ecumenically] have strength to grasp the breadth and the length, the height and the depth; until...you are filled with the utter fullness of God." (Ephesians 3: 17 -19)

May God continue to bless you unto His glory.

Message from SHERRY FUGITT-TAYLOR

Dear Bro. Lincoln and members of the Antioch Baptist Church,

First let me congratulate you on 50 years of service to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ! I have been reading my Daddy's (Rev. Riley Fugitt) autobiography and reminiscing about his and my Mom's relationship with St. Kitts. My Daddy came to St. Kitts for the first time in 1966 with the "New Life Movement" in Puerto Rico. This is when he met Bro. William Connor. This started a relationship that would last until he died in 2002. Brother Lincoln was one of the preachers that spoke at Daddy's funeral.

In June of 1971, Daddy and my brother, Rev. Mickey Fugitt, came to St. Kitts for a crusade. There were at least fifteen conversions that they knew for sure and only God knows how many more. They were there nearly two weeks. In 1975, Daddy took two groups of twelve to St. Kitts for two weeks (one group the first week and another group the second week). They worked on the buildings and held services at night.

On July 24, 1979 (my birthday), on the way to St. Kitts, a group of twelve from First Baptist Church, Clyde, TX, including my Daddy, Mother and brother were aboard a Prinair airplane at St. Croix. The plane crashed on takeoff and five precious souls perished. My family were all hurt, but survived. Daddy was in the hospital 60 days, Mom 38 days and Mickey a few days.

In 1980 Daddy retired and made plans to come to St. Kitts and start a Bible Institute. Starting in January 1981, they spent the next three years with Daddy teaching the Bible courses. They were so proud of their students. They called Daddy Professor. He loved that! They lived with Maureen Solomon and loved her like a daughter and I loved her like a sister. She has since gone on to glory with Mom, Dad, my husband and Bro. Connor greeting her there.

My husband and I visited St. Kitts twice-once in 1983 and once in 1988. We loved the island and the people. Brother Connor and Maureen both visited in our home several times and they were like family to us. So you can see my family is planted deep in the soil of St. Kitts.

I wish I could be there to help you celebrate.

Bro. Connor was a Sociologist—he understood the community and the needs of the people. He is fondly remembered for his ingenious of placing his public address system on his bus and driving around the villages of St Kitts bellowing to the top of his lungs, "Mammy! Mammy! Mammy! Calling up all the children to Sunday School." This Pastor – Sociologist did so with the full recognition that women were in charge of the house-holds on this island.

The uniqueness and insight-fullness of Bro. Connor made his Sunday School the place to be on Sunday afternoons. One

could stay deep in the village and hear the hundreds of young and old voices challenging the quarters of hell with vibrant, electrifying singing. This tall imposing Pastor pranced through the aisles (usually with a stick in his hand for the keeping of rhythmic time). Pastor Connor's voice would pierce like an instrument tuned for that purpose "Sing!!!" It was not a command, for every "sails" was already singing. It was just one of the ways in which his presence was brought to blend with the presence of all the people. Even in the Sunday School's singing, Pastor Connor never allowed the congregation to forget that God was in charge. Although, she had a Catholic background, Mrs. Patricia 'Dolly' Arthur recalls that she enjoyed the Sunday School. She remarked, "Bro. Connor's Sunday School was very happy and sang songs that I loved and remember even today."

Bro. Connor's Sunday School was not only spiritual; it was fun. Bro Connor's Sunday School as it was referred to then, was the sole religious grouping that organised picnics (Sunday School Outings). These were a fixture on the calendar annually. They were looked forward to with great anticipation. The children were transported in trucks to Caines', Willett's or Brotherson's pasture. As it was the only time that one would take a drive through the entire island, the event was not to be missed. The children and adults participated in lively singing with hand clapping and bouncing to the rhythm from the time the trucks pulled out (from Wigley Avenue and later Infirmary road after the sanctuary was constructed) until it arrived the destination. The ritual was completed once again on the way into Basseterre after the day's event. The most friightening part of the journey was driving across Old Road Bay with children pounding on the truck and screaming to the driver, 'drive chauffer drive' in a bid to have the driver accelerate and over take the other drivers.

The picnics, plus so many other events and activities, made the Sunday School a force to be reckoned with. The Sunday School ministry was only one of the many avenues opened by Bro. Connor to spread the gospel. The Oxford Sports Club was established in 1951 and a touch type writing school in 1957. These organizations were used as vehicles for the spreading of the gospel. To chronicle the many unique aspects of the St. Johnston Village Sunday School then the Antioch Baptist Sunday School would require the writing of a journal. The Sunday School brought out all of the talents of its people. At a time when Mass was held in Latin and in some quarters only well to do people were accepted—Bro. Connor's Sunday School was the place to be.

Bro. Connor recounted the early days of the Sunday School, "We were not appointed, commissioned and sent out by a board, a convention or association. We were sent out by the Lord to the back streets of our village. We had no blue print. We had no plans. We had no programs. We had no buildings. We had no money. We had no benches. We had no Sunday School specialists. We had no experts. We had no training in child psychology, sociology and theology. We had no training in those subjects. What we had was a black Bible, a big stick, bless God, and the leadership of the Holy Spirit of God and we went across our village because we saw a need, because we had a vision, because we had a dream, because we had a burden and because we had a call. I rang the bell. I blow the shell. I drove the bus. I swept the building. I taught the school. I kept the money and I paid the rent".

The Sunday School conducted some of the best programmes ever in St Kitts which drew huge crowds. One of the most interesting was "Joseph and His Brethren." These performances were held in Basseterre Girl's School Hall (owned by the Anglican Church). However, in the the late 1950's Bro Connor's relationship with the Church became strained and as a result he was denied further use of the hall. The Sunday School's programmes were hereafter held at the Grammar School or Unity Friendly Society Hall, until the edifice on Infirmary Road was constructed in 1966.

Bro. Connor was undeniably a charismatic leader and so the number of children attending Sunday School increased dramatically. The growth was attributed to the enthusiasm of workers and Bro Connor's charisma. Brother Connor played his part in opening the minds and the consciousness of our people to the fact that there is a better way, a higher road, a nobler path.

Bro. Connor's actions did not meet with approval. Rather he was accused by the St. George's Vestry of being evangelical since he was not teaching Anglican doctrine at the Sunday School. Bro. Connor was converted during a revival at the Wesley Methodist Church in Basseterre in 1951. Bro Samuel Nathaniel later disclosed that God began "working mightily in Bro. Connor". He said this warrior of the gospel who was "an ardent reader" became aware of "the need for Christianity" and of the need to promulgate the gospel". Bro. Connor was "obedient to the call as a disciple of God," according to Bro. Nathaniel, because of his deep concern for the young people in the village area.

Bro. Connor, soon after his conversion, began a Bible Study on Monday Nights in the Unity Friendly Society Hall in 1951. Then The Wycliffe Crusaders were formed in 1958. This group of vibrant young men rode bicycles through St Kitts conducting open-air services. The group also went on traditional Christmas Carolling.


The Wycliffe Crusaders formed the backbone of the church that was to come into being a few years later. Members of the group included Kelvin Jones, Kelvin Thompson, Andrew James Isaac, Earnest Grey, David Liddie, Marc Powell, Alburn "Melody", Doyling/ Thomas, Samuel Nathaniel and Nassibou Butler, who drafted the group's policy – "To wage war against sin". Motto – "Looking unto Jesus" – and Aim – "Victory in Jesus."

By 1959, many had been converted as a result of the Bible Class and Wycliffe Crusaders Open Airs. The Sunday School was growing at a phenomenal rate. Many women had also surrendered their lives to Christ: - Margaret Thompson, Cynthia Amory, Viola Griffin, Claris Williams, Mary Simmonds, Cynthia Fieldings, Shirley Hanley, Susanna O'Garro, V Procope, Josephine Nias, Valeria Charles, J Tuitt, Doreen Wilkes and Rosalie Kelly.

The Inner Temple, a wooden 10' x 8' wooden building was constructed at the home of his mother at Russell Village at a cost of \$400.00 and was dedicated on Friday, 03 December, 1959. It served the group as a prayer and board meeting room and typing centre. It was here the Sunday School staff held regular meetings and Bible Study.

On Sunday, 06 August 1960, Bro. Connor left for the United States of America. He was taken by his aunt, Henrietta Tuckett, to the Thessolonica Baptist Church in the Bronx and was impressed with the style of worship and independence of the church. This was it!

Concerned that time was far spent and it was no longer time to argue, debate or discuss, but to fight, Bro Connor began contemplating crossing swords and pioneering the first Baptist Church in St Kitts.



The Cardinal Sin

Bro Connor was classified as a threat to the religious establishment. In 1962 he received a letter from the St George's Vestry which levied the following charges against him:

- 1. Absenting himself from Evensong on several occasions
- 2. His behaviour (the nature of behaviour not mentioned)
- 3. The establishment of undenominational Sunday Schools in the Parish. Bro. Connor's response was a seven page letter of resignation.

Bro. Connor had committed what he described as the 'cardinal sin' in cutting himself off from the 'Mother' Church. The Anglican priest visited every home in the Village and encouraged the parents not to send their children to Bro. Connor's Sunday School. Bro. Connor did not let that deter him, rather he stood at the top of Wigley Avenue each Sunday with a bag of sweets distributing to the children and with a few weeks the attendance once more exceeded 300. The Sunday School roll eventually grew to over 700 thus establishing Bro. Connor as the self proclaimed 'Sunday School Giant' of St. Kitts-Nevis.

The Birth of the Baptist Movement

At a time when the missionary zeal of the United States of America was at its peak, when the churches of the United States were sending their people to pastor and pioneer West Indian Mission Houses, and when men like President John F Kennedy of the United States of America were posting Peace Corps around the world, Pastor Connor was among the first of a handful of native Kittitians to take the initiative to throw out a home grown life line to his own people.

On Monday, 04 March, 1963, Bro Connor along with Pastor Ray Thompson of St Thomas, United States Virgin Islands held discussions with the converts in the Inner Temple. Twenty-one Converts including Susanna O'Garro, Josephine Nias, Claris Williams Ismay Francis, Rosalie Kelly, Urban Penny, Kelvin Jones , Mary Tuitt, Ida Vanlow Louisa Frazer, Mary Simmonds, Spencer Walwyn, Laura Pemberton, Merleise Allen along with Bro Connor decided that they were ready for the waters of Baptism. The following day, Tuesday 5th March, at 5:00 a.m., the converts were baptised at Lime Kiln Beach. Despite adversity, in the providence of God on that same day – 05 March 1963, Bro Connor along with the converts came together with the assistance of Pastor Thompson and others of St Thomas and started the Antioch Baptist Church of St Kitts.

That same day two (2) of the converts forsook the work and returned to their former church. Sis Mary Tuitt was encouraged by her Methodist Minister to abandon Bro Connor and the Baptist Witness but she refused. Bro Kelvin Jones and Bro Urban Penny were ex-communicated from the Wesley Methodist Church. Every evangelical church in St Kitts ridiculed Bro Connor for starting a Baptist Church. He was described as Humpty Dumpty on the wall and everyone was eagerly awaiting Humpty Dumpty's fall. To God be the glory—after fifty years we are still here to praise His name.

On 19 May of the same year, the first Pastor Bro William M Connor was ordained at the Calvary Baptist Church, St Thomas, United States Virgin Islands. Bro Connor thus became the first Pastor of the Antioch Baptist Church in St Kitts. From that time, it was a struggle for the young aspiring minister. People from all walks of life came out against him. Some doubted his ability to build a church, others sought ways to stop him but he could not be stopped. Pastor Connor often remarked, "I will do my duty as I see it and leave the rest to God."


On Sunday 26 May, 1963, the first communion service was held. Twenty-four believers shared in the Lord's Supper at the Unity Friendly Society Hall. The Hall was locally called "The Black and White" and was used for wedding receptions and dances. As a result, on many occasions much cleaning had to be done on Sunday mornings before church. This was unacceptable and new ways were sought to correct the situation.

The excitement of these new believers could not be guenched. Therefore, on 12 March 1963, the week following the formal establishment of the church, the mission which had no money, recall a miracle when the Lord through Sister Sue Ogarro provided the funds in the amount of of \$2.750.00 to purchase an old four room wooden house from Esbon Ross, the current location of the present sanctuary. On Sunday, 31 March 1963, a Sunday School session and an evening service were held on the premises.

Things were happening in the new church. There was excitement. There was power and there was vision. Towards the end of 1963, the church purchased from A M Losado Ltd a 12 seater Bedford van costing \$4,800.00, for the purpose of transporting its members, thus becoming the first church in the island to own a vehicle. The license plate number was CN1867, and the first driver was Bro Kelvin Jones. As it was vet unheard of for a church to own a van, this evoked jealousy from the already existing churches.

The Antioch Baptist Church recognised the importance of the Bus Ministry and led the way. Today practically every church in the island has a Transportation Ministry.



I however became acutely aware of him, as he traversed the streets of that community, seemingly, as its patriarch. Be it on his bicycle with bell in hand, or walking through the streets and alley ways, he towered over all, commanding respect from the entire community. Mount Carmel Baptist Church

In the year following its formation, driven by a missionary spirit and upon the invitation of Ms. Marjorie Weeks, the Antioch Church started a new mission station in Lodge Village.

That same year, 1964 Bro Urban Penny and Bro Kelvin Jones were ordained on Sunday, 01 November as the first two Deacons. Deacon Penny died at sea on 02 August 1976 after serving the Lord faithfully as Deacon, Preacher and Sunday School Superintendent. In that same year, Deacon Kelvin Jones was ordained and installed as the first Pastor of the Mount Carmel Baptist Church which was the second Baptist Church in St Kitts. Pastor Jones' journey with the Baptist Witness in the Federation began with his conversion on 16 March 1959. When Kelvin Jones attended the Bible Class session conducted by the Bro. Connor, God spoke to Kelvin and he trusted Christ as his Saviour.

Pastor Jones linked up with the Wycliffe Crusaders. When the Baptist Witness was in its embryonic stages, Pastor Jones had plans to migrate to Canada to pursue studies in medicine but felt the Lord calling him instead to work alongside Bro Connor in pioneering the Baptist Movement in the Federation. Pastor Jones also pastored the Antioch Baptist Church for twelve years after the death of Pastor William Connor, 11 November 1990 until Bro. Lincoln Connor was ordained and installed as pastor on Sunday, 26 May 2002. Today we are indebted to Pastor Jones for his sacrifice and selfless service to the Lord and the Baptist Witness in the Federation.

The Fire Spreads

The Holy Ghost fire that had consumed St. Johnston Village and the surrounding areas was now spreading around the island. This time in the western direction. Information out of the village of St Pauls had indicated that a group of young men wearing black shirts and bearing the name 'Black Shirt Gang' was terrorising the villagers.

Establishing a work in St Pauls was no easy task. Bro Connor and his team were greeted with open hostility. The villagers who had already attached themselves to one of the existing churches (Pilgrim Holiness, Church of God, Anglican or Methodist) concluded that Connor should leave, for they wanted no more church. Bro Connor was continuously praying and encouraged the workers with these words:

Despite people's efforts to retard the work of the Sunday School, it was attracting members. This inspired Bro Connor to begin another Sunday School in the Lodge at Newton Ground. This second Sunday School was placed in the charge of Ms Lorna Harvey. The village of Parsons was next. The children were gathered at the side of the road and taught the Bible. Eventually, the residents allowed him to use the community centre but later withdrew this privilege.

"We are surrounded by misery, but if it's God's

will we will stay, if not, we will leave."

May God bless us all.

The school then moved back to the side of the road. Eventually, the Parsons Sunday school was being held on the verandah of Sis Lucina Francis – of the Calvary Baptist Church. Six years after the Sunday School began in St Pauls, the work was organised into a mission by the Antioch Baptist Church. The Mission began on Friday, 03 September, 1971, with 12 members. Pastor Kelvin Jones of the Mount Carmel Baptist Church spoke on the subject "We are Moving On". The first member of the new mission to die was Bro Eustace Pringle.

In 1971, the top floor of a two-storey wooden building was rented from Sis Myrtle Micham, now deceased, and was used as a place of worship for the new Mission. The ground floor was a rum shop. Services were held mainly in the night after Sunday School. The building was later bought by the Antioch Baptist Church for the sum of \$9,600.00 and another \$6,400 was spent in repairs, a total of \$16,000. Then in August 1974, the land measuring 4,200 sq ft, Lot No 227, was bought from the Government for the sum of \$1,000.00.

In the providence of God, believing that it was God's will, thirty-six believers entered into covenant to become an organised fellowship of baptised Baptist believers on Thursday, 07 August, 1975, thus establishing the Calvary Baptist Church, the third Baptist Church in St Kitts, with Bro Connor as its first Pastor. The speaker for that occasion was Pastor Clifford Phillip of North Carolina, United States of America. Deacon Urban Penny, collected the offering which totalled \$225.00.

With the introduction of exciting, enriched and new programmes within re-organized ministries, slated for the new church year, it is envisaged that the Antioch Baptist Church will provide an opportunity for more stimulating and effective ways of learning, participating and fellowshipping. It is expected that the package would also allow for the church family to reach beyond our current mission area, for a chance to attract new members whilst simultaneously inspiring and stimulating present members to grow in knowledge and service of our Lord and Saviour.

Formulating a strategic plan to realize this vision is the task of a planning team, lead by our Senior Pastor. Although the renewal process may seem difficult, still, we must pull together, as people of God to move mountains. Antioch Baptist has come a long way over the last 50 years; and by the grace of God, it will in the future be further developed and cemented.

I wish finally to thank the 50th Anniversary Committee members most sincerely for all the work undertaken to organize meaningful and memorable celebrations, suitable for the commemoration of such an important, historic milestone event. It is my fervent hope and prayer that the good Lord will continue to steer, guide and sustain this great mission, as it continues to grow from strength to strength, to His honour and Glory.

With the establishment of the church, services were held at Sunday mornings and Sunday evenings. The growth of the work and limited transportation placed a strain on the workers travelling to Calvary. The Sunday morning speaker had to be in St Pauls by Saturday evening. The alternative was waking up at dawn and stationing themselves at the Bottling Company "Bryson Factory" to seek transportation. By good faith it might be possible to get transport to Old Road where you began walking until you met a kindhearted driver travelling in your direction who might be willing to take you to St Pauls.

Mr Rudolph Isles (deceased) recalled, "often we walked from Sandy Point to St Pauls and upon arrival, there was no time to rest but to take our position at the pulpit and deliver the Word."

During the years that Pastor Connor ministered the work of the Mission, two young men, Bro James Hazel and Bro Enric Richards answered the call of God to full time work and one of the young ladies, Sis Lyneth Hazel went off to Bible School. The two men are today out in the field pasturing Baptist Churches in the United States of America.

On 14 November 1972, Bro. Calvin Hazel was licensed by the Antioch Baptist Church as a gospel preacher. After working alongside

Pastor Connor for four years as Assistant Pastor, on Monday, 18 July 1977, the Antioch Baptist Church ordained Bo. Hazel as Pastor to the full gospel ministry. The ordination was attended by the then Governor General, Sir Probyn Inniss and the message was delivered by Pastor Riley Fugitt of Clyde, Texas, United States of America. In January 1981, Pastor Calvin Hazel was given full responsibility for the Calvary Ministry by the Antioch Baptist church.

Youth In Focus

Early in the establishment of the Baptist Movement,

young people played a critical role. On 21 April 1966, Pastor Connor established the "Ambassadors for Christ", an organization for girls, with the aim of training them in domestic work. The first President was Sis. Enid Sommersall. Another organization, the "Brotherhood", was established for the boys. The Brotherhood produced the "Baptist Star" a monthly publication that revealed news and other items of interest from the Antioch Baptist Church. In 1980, both groups were amalgamated to form the Young Baptist Fellowship. In June 1983, a delegation of six namely J. Dasent, O. Hazel, J. Whyte, M. Byron, E. Phipps and C. Benjamin along with Pastor Connor attended the 11th World Congress of International Council of Christian Churches (ICCC) at Cape May, New Jersey, United States of America.

The Antioch Baptist Church continues its tradition of a strongth emphasis in youth development.



As one carefully analyses the situation of the Federation's first Baptist Church today, it is comforting to note that at Antioch, relationships are warm and cordial, engendering as it were, a family-type atmosphere. There is high involvement of dedicated, hardworking individuals in all ministry areas, led and encouraged by our resourceful Senior Pastor, who is committed to promoting and assigning leadership roles to those with the appropriate skills, gifting and willingness to learn and lead.

The strengths of the Church include: the use of applicable Information Technology Systems; programs and activities geared toward building knowledge of Bible and life issues and cooperation with other churches, institutions and organizations. Antioch's weaknesses lie mostly in the physical limitations of the church's property and surrounding area, for existing programs; and there is most certainly, a lack of space for expanded or new initiatives. Inadequate financial resources are of course also a source of concern.

Despite these challenges however, the Antioch family would like to see a re-organization and increase in the programming of the various ministries, to include amalgamation, improved transportation, communication and information technology. This should allow for a more effective outreach appeal to residents over a wider geographic area. Additionally, given the demands for programming space, the time seems right for an architectural renewal of our facility. The opportunity is also ripe for building, in a tangible way, on the co-operation of our fraternal churches, institutions and other organizations.

Whilst it is true however, that it is important to be ever mindful of weaknesses and outside threats, it is imperative to remain true to Antioch's strengths and philosophy and to the opportunities at hand. And so, with the confidence that we will be sustained by the Holy Spirit, we must press on in the fundamental acceptance, that growing the church is the work of the Holy Spirit, as the church belongs to Him. I am of the view that God has gifted the Pastor and his team with the task of leadership, for the management of the "gifts" of His church.

I further believe that the mandate of the church's ministries is to assist the Pastor to minister the Word of God in such a way, that family relations will be restored, the wayward would return to God and that together we would work to transform our people into devoted followers of God.

It is our aim therefore, as leaders within the Church Ministries, embodied in love, prayer, obedience, discernment and servant-hood, to be prepared to use our gifts to compliment Pastor's and together, to take the initiative as effective leaders, to endeavour to build a church of loving and caring people, who touch the lives of others with warmth and inspiration; not only within the Church family, but within our homes and the community at large.

Tomorrow Monday 5th March will mark the 21st anniversary of the founding of the Antioch Baptist Church. The first Baptist Church of St. Kitts.

As God would have it, in 1963, 21 years ago, the Lord added another army to bombard the devil and so the 5 March 1963, 22 of us felt the call of God to join forces. We summon up the blood, unleash the gallant battle axe—the Bible and with relentless, reckless furry, like an erupting convulsive volcano, belching out hot lava, move on the war path for God. Shout yes everybody.

My brethren selected me to be the overseer of the new work understanding the gap and to make up the edge, a position, I still hold after 21 years and I have no intention to back off. When I was called to administer this church, I was fully aware and fully conscious of the fact that a prophet has no honour in his own country. I was fully aware of that. I knew Mr Connor you are from this country a native son of the soil and there is no honour for you. I was fully aware of that.

When I was called to administer this church, I was fully aware and fully conscious of my inability and my unworthiness but I was equally convinced that with God, all things are possible and so I went to the fight looking to God for help so in March, I took up the ministry of this church in partnership with God and I haven't regretted one day. After 21 years have won every fight, I have won every fight. I have won every bout in the match and I thank God for that this morning. Abraham Lincoln, the 16th President of the United States who died on the 14 April 1865, once said, "I shall do my duty as I see it and leave the rest with God." Those words of this great man, Abraham Lincoln, those words have greatly inspired me and have challenged me and I went on doing my duty as I see it leaving the rest with God.

And the subject on which I would like to address you is entitled: 'One Nation of People Under God' As a foundation to the message, I wish to draw your attention to Psalm 33:12.

There is within the breast of each individual, the desire to be free, to independent, so that we can manage our own affairs. So these two beautiful sisters of the Caribbean, St Kitts and Nevis, tonight 18 September 1983, will dismantle themselves of 360 years of British rule and will prepare to take that long step into the unknown future, looking to God for guidance

As we stand on the threshold of Independence, we must remain in the never changing hands of Almighty God, who directs our affairs, and though we may pledge allegiance to our land, we may state as did Sir Thomas Moore to King Henry VIII of England; "We are our Government's good servants, but God's first." ...

There seems to be a lessening sense of sin in our country; morality and respect for God's word, His day, and His house seem to be things of the past. We must put God and the Bible back in this country. We must remember that righteousness exalteth or lifts up or elevates a nation, but sin is a reproach or a disgrace to any people... I feel that we have shaken loose from the discipline of marriage, family, church and government. Adultery is creeping into the sanctity of marriage and teenage pregnancy continually haunts us. Our young people no longer aspire to excellence. They believe that merely possessing ability is a reserve ticket for achievement. We no longer associate efficiency with reward...

My people, I urge you to let us go forward from here together as one nation of people under God. I urge you to let us live together in unity. The Bible records in Psalms 133:1 "how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to live together in unity". United we can live up to our ideals and capture the admiration of the world, but if we are disunited, we will fall into shame and disgrace... Let us go forward together as one nation of People under God. For blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord. If God be for us, who can be against us? 12 WAYS TO KILL YOUR CHURCH

- 1 Don't come, and if you come, only on Sunday morning
- 2 If you do come, come late, and when you leave go out through the back door.

- 4 Visit other churches half the time, show your pastor you aren't tied down to one church and that you are free.

When the memorial service was held for this founding father, the late Rev. Dr. William Connor, the honour was mine to have been asked by Rev. Lincoln Connor the nephew, to preach the sermon.

Time and space is not available to say much more about my time and ministry at the Antioch Baptist Church and St. Kitts as an Island, but I am compelled to express my deepest gratitude to the Almighty God for the experience in knowing and ministering to and among my special Caribbean brethren.

I am using this medium to encourage parents and members of the church to motivate their children to capitalize on the opportunity to get more involved generally in the church's music ministry and more specifically in learning to play the different instruments at Antioch and hone the skill for God's glory. Ministry at Antioch: Admittedly, the people of Jamaica and the people of St. Kitts have much in common. We are of the same African descent, our main source of income was from sugar cane, (St. Kitts was even called 'Sugar City), and English is our main language, but there are few noticeable minor cultural differences between us. The morning worship service structures come to mind. At Antioch, the American musical upbeat rhythm is used in services in the singing of hymns/songs. I also found the leading of worship services at Antioch to be more pastor- centered. While at home we cling more to the traditional rhythm and more to the British hymns. We also allow more persons the opportunity to participate in the leading of worship. But for me because worship is dynamic not static, the few cultural differences were no problem. They were embraced and fully enjoyed.

While I was engaged, in various ministries at Antioch, it was less strenuous in comparison to ministry at home where I had to pastor three different congregations and do community duties as Justice of the Peace etc. Leading worship and preaching on Sunday mornings, participating in Sunday evening services, conducting weekly Bible Study, visiting the sick, and spending time in the office were my main weekly duties at Antioch and for sure Antioch and I had things in common. We looked forward as pastor and people to spending time together in worshipping God.

Visitation: Special mention must be made of the weekly Visitation Ministry with the wonderful ladies of Antioch headed by Sister Enid Shoy. We visited mainly the hospital with occasional visits to a few shut-ins at their homes. A special visitation bond was forged between the seven ladies and me during my entire stay and although I was the lone male, we looked forward to visiting the sick. We also led several persons to accepting Jesus Christ as their personal Lord and Saviour and cheered the hearts of many. Mention must be made of Minister Dameon Jacobs our regular driver and Evangelist L. Knight, our occasional driver for transporting us on weekly trips.

Perhaps, the request from the Antioch Baptist Church in St. Kitts through their pastor Rev. Lincoln Connor to the Jamaica Baptist Union for pastoral assistance to the Antioch Church in his absence on study leave was God's plan for my life. Information received is that I was the first person the union thought of when the request came and this for me could be interpreted to mean that the God who reads the recesses of every heart guided the union in asking me to consider this request.

I answered the call to serve as interim pastor of the Antioch Church and served September to November 2010 and was invited to serve a second stint January to May 2012. Two other senior colleague ministers of the Union also served as interim pastors between the times of my services. On reflection, my two pastoral mission trips were of special spiritual blessings reciprocally as will be shown later. The first stint set the pace for Antioch to have had the confidence of asking me to return to close this special pastoral relationship forged between us on one hand and between Antioch and the Jamaica Baptist Union on the other hand.

Antioch Church Reception: The people of Antioch were very warm and receptive to me on arrival and during my entire stay as their pastor. Special efforts were also made to make me feel at home and very often enquiries were made about the well-being of my family and this circuit of churches I had left to serve Antioch.

Let me document what I said verbally to you my dear brothers and sisters of Antioch; for your love, care, respect, encourage and generosity you showered on me during my pastoral stay with you in St. Kitts, I will always be grateful and you will remain on my prayer list.

As we travel this road, here are a few more points worth considering:

If you build it, people will not necessarily come. Whether it is a website, blog, chat board, podcast, twitter feed or Facebook page, our digital presence must be relevant, must demand attention, must add value to people's lives and must be seen as trustworthy. Moreover, it must be marketed, even if it is by frequent mention via traditional means such as radio.

The ride on the Information Highway is not free. It might not be as expensive as some other traditional means of communication, but there is the recurring cost of time and energy to produce fresh and relevant content, the time cost factor of connecting to our online community (emailing, responding to questions, engaging in conversations, etc). In fact, the dollar cost grows with its level of use and sophistication.

It is not only the younger generation that uses technology. However, to better steward technology, just as pertains to business, we need to meet people where ever they connect, whether this is in front of their television set, via the radio, twitter, Facebook etc. This notwithstanding, there might still be a mission for the church to provide training to its constituents in using modern tools such as video equipment, and online services, to better prepare them to be citizens of our modern environment. In this area too, the Antioch Baptist Church is already making significant inroads.

On a final note, technology does not replace real-life relationships. Technology enables the church to communicate with more people in more ways without the constraint of time or space, but it is not a substitute for the church's face to face gatherings, where heart, soul, mind and spirit can be best be ministered by the physical presence of the human touch or smile.

The Church On The Information Highway

The church has long used technology to communicate, archive, and evangelize, in its efforts to ensure ultimately, that God's will be done on earth: Stone hieroglyphs, papyri, drums, printing press, microphones, and video projectors. Man's personal and commercial drive for omniscience, has birthed what we today dub, "the Information Highway". This is principally data and Internet driven, spawning tools such as websites, social media, texting, mobile TV, and from simple to sophisticated public address systems.

The question today is: how might the church mastermind its presence on this highway to fulfil God's command to "go into all the world and preach the gospel"? The pioneering spirit of the Antioch Baptist church is already securing its position along this great journey. The gradual but steady growth of its orchestra, its prevalent use of music, PA system and video projectors to enhance its worship experience and Media Ministries to capture important moments for posterity, its presence on the Internet, its use of technology to archive its resources, together send a powerful message that it is serious about using technology in Kingdom building.

Much as the gospel message is eternal, it is difficult for God's people to influence the 21st century if we are not adequately knowledgeable about modern tools for influencing world opinion, such as the Internet (email, Facebook, twitter, website, etc). We need to saturate the Internet with evangelistic websites and information, which can win over unbelievers from the kingdom of darkness, to Christ's marvellous light, much as we have done with the overwhelming physical presence of churches in our communities.

Pastor Lincoln Connor is a Minister of the Gospel who posesses passion. Yes, passion. There is a distinct and noticeable difference between the passion of Pastor Lincoln Connor and a large number of gospel Ministers. Pastor Lincoln Connor believes two important things make his ministry one of a different caliber. These two things are:

- 1. He believes that the best way to truly transform people is to understand them and that the only way to understand them is to educate himself, and he is correct.

Pastor Connor does not use his time focusing on his critics nor his detractors of which we can be certain there are some. He rather uses his time thinking how he may make the path clear, the vision plain, the people grow and the nation better. No one can do this without being angry at times, as quite often, passion rides on the wings of a storm. Jesus once stormed through a church with a whip in his hand leaving in his wake overturned desks, chairs and tables, along with flapping birds hiding in the ceiling and money scattered all over the ground. Someone had to straighten up the place when it was all over, but the people got his message. Sometimes the only way to make people understand that they need to change for the better is to generate a storm and Pastor Connor is not afraid to do so when it is necessary. Possessing passion is a vital part of successful leadership.

St. Kitts is Pastor Connor's nesting place. Wherever he travels in the world his mind is preoccupied with St. Kitts because St. Kitts is his home. His church is the core through which he reaches touches and challenges the people of his nation, and he does it well. His vision is broader than the four walls of any building. The building is only his mailing address. The nation is his mission field, and his people, no matter their age or social status, are neither above nor below his interest, his love and his willingness to care. He is a Minister of the people. St. Kitts and Nevis will only be better under many more years of his exemplary leadership.

Pastor Connor receives award from Dr. Edward Mc Abee at the church's 25th anniversary, March 1988

On 11th November 1990, Bro. William Connor made the triumphant march and went to be with the Lord. At the time of his passing he had served the Lord faithfully as a Sunday School teacher for 41 years, a Christian for 39 years and Pastor of the Antioch Baptist Church for 27 years.

At the time of his passing, Bro. Connor had received several honours including:

- 1979 Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II appointed him an Officer of the British Empire. He was also awarded the Doctor of Divinity by the Caribbean Evangelical Association Incorporated.
- 1981 he was appointed an Honourary Deputy Sheriff of the State of Texas, USA.
- 1982 he was awarded Citizen of the Year by the organization of Progressive Nationals of St. Kitts as eminently and ethically qualified in the field of Sociology.
- 1983 when St. Kitts was granted Independent status from England, he was afforded the honour of giving the Keynote Address before a crowd of some 23,000 people.
- 1983 he was commissioned to the Order of Kentucky Colonels of the State of Kentucky, USA.
- 1986 he was awarded an Honorary Citizenship of the City of Lincoln in the State of Illinois, USA.
- 1988 he was also appointed as Lieutenant Colonel Aide De Camp Governor, Staff by His Excellency the Governor of the State of Georgia, USA.
- 1988 he was honoured by the Government of St. Kitts-Nevis by having the new St. Johnston Village Primary School named in his honour, (Dr. Williams Connor Primary).
